First of all, it is truly an honor for me to become a member of such a wonderful wing and have the opportunity to command such a fantastic Group. I'm also back to my roots, C-130 maintenance. In fact, back in my enlisted years I may have worked on some of the aircraft now assigned here

Now, before anyone says, "Hey, this guy stole a portion from Colonel Tarchick's article," I will

start off by saying that when I assumed my last command, my priorities, were; first, mission, and second, people. I don't mean to diminish the importance of taking care of our folks, just the opposite. I place high value on recruiting, retaining and recognizing our most valuable resource, you. However, without the mission, we would all be doing something else on weekends and that's why in my current command capacity, those priorities have not changed.

As commander I work for you, the men and women of the maintenance group. What that means to me is that my focus is on ensuring you have what is needed to accomplish the mission and I will do what I can to help you become as successful as you want to be in your career. Please keep me in the loop and well informed of your intentions and desires.

A desire we all have is to do well on inspections. In October our wing will have three at the same time; a UCI, an MSEP and an HSI. Since my last wing just went through them in July, I have some insight.

What was found common to the inspection teams was their professionalism, knowledge, courtesy and a true willingness to help. They will "write-you-up" for not being in compliance, but the team members provide specific references and many good ideas on how to improve programs and processes. There will be a time to dispute findings prior to the report being finalized so please don't become confrontational or argumentative.

Other hints:

- Treat the team members with the same professionalism and courtesy they show you
 - Duty sections should be clean, neat and organized
 - Fix what you can on-the-spot!
- Be truthful and as accurate as you can be when responding to questions
- Be confident; let them see just how outstanding you are at your job
- Relax, or fake it well; being nervous will not provide a sense of competency
 - Think OPSEC & COMSEC
 - Look sharp, it never hurts
 - Be safe, always
 - Smile

Hints for the MSEP in particular

- Little mistakes will "Eat Your Lunch" so don't make them
- The checklists on the AFRC A4 websites are the same ones they will run on us
- CTK; check tool boxes for FOD, etchings, inventories
- Training records; review now to make sure individuals are signed off properly
 - TOs: must be current with deleted pages removed
- Stands: check forms, lock wheels and castors properly prior to use
- When receiving a Personal Evaluation, read the task outlined in the TO out-loud, line by line, this will ensure you



do not skip a step

- PPE is an easy gotcha; ensure proper eye and hearing protection, use gloves when touching an unknown liquid
 - Vehicles: keep them clean and free of FOD
 - Safety, Safety, Safety

Obviously there is an endless list of things to do preparing for these inspections. The above is intended to provide you some sort of focus based on my experience and daily feedback sessions with the team chiefs.

We will do great and I'm glad to be here.





Inspired husband follows footsteps to desert

"I'll never watch the news in the same way again," said a 934th Maintenance Group Lieutenant Colonel following her recent return from Iraq.

Lt. Col. Maureen "Moe" Banavige, 934th Maintenance Squadron commander, spent six-months in the Multinational Zone (formerly known as the "Green Zone") in Baghdad, Iraq, serving as a liaison officer between the Air Force, Army and the Iraq Air Force, facilitating training and maintenance for the Iraq Air Force fixed-wing and helicopter programs.

She found it fascinating to watch the interaction between the members of the various branches, and found

flying hour records in the 1960s, flew to Antarctica, was involved in numerous deployments, and served as the wing's Air Mobility Command Rodeo competition aircraft in 2000, before being transferred to Ramstein Air Base, Ger-

many a few years later, and subsequently to Iraq.

"It was great seeing that airplane again!" the colonel exclaimed. "It still has 934th Airlift Wing decals on three of the four engines, so I felt like I was among friends, despite being in the desert environment. I'm in the Maintenance Group here and that aircraft and I have a lot of history together, which made it all the more special."

During her six-month deployment, she kept in constant contact with her husband, Joe, and their children.

"The kids handled the deployment quite well, but they are still at an age where they don't ask a lot of questions," she said.

As for her husband - that's another story. While the colonel was telling him about her experiences, he became inspired to do something to help the effort over there. He joined the U.S. Department of State as a civilian economic advisor.

After her return in June, they had a brief reunion before he went to

Washington, D.C., for a training course and is now deployed in Iraq on a one-year tour.

"So now I guess it's my turn to have to sit at home and worry," she said.

When asked if she would go again, Lt. Col. Banavige said she has no future deployments on the horizon. She is just waiting for her husband to return so they can have another reunion.

Still, she is as proud of him for going over as he was with her.

"After all, what we're witnessing in Iraq is the birth of a nation. And to have had a role in it is incredible. How cool is that?"

Her one-year reign will be a busy one, attending numerous municipal parades, festivals and charity events, visiting senior homes and benefit dinners and even having breakfast with Santa.

"I love it!" said the 21 year-old reservist. "We work with all types of civic organizations promoting recycling efforts, National Night Out and other great causes." Kvamme will serve with one other East Bethel Princess this year and will compete next year for the position of Queen of the Lakes of the Minneapolis Aquatennial. "That's very exciting," she said. "This year's Queen of the Lakes is from the Air National Guard!"

Becoming royalty is not an easy task, according to Kvamme. She met privately with a panel of judges who grilled her with numerous questions. "It was pretty nerve-wracking," she said. Answering questions onstage was next with a little twist thrown in. "The judges said that they heard I liked to sing and that I had to sing them a song right then. All I could think of was 'Mary Had a Little Lamb,' so that's what they got!"

The pageant is actually a scholarship opportunity, with contestants judged on self-confidence, community involvement and how well they will represent the city. "This isn't a beauty contest, although I'm sure some of that plays into the decision," she commented. "It's about how well you hold yourself, like in the formalwear competition. Are you comfortable with what you're wearing? Is it appropriate for your age? How do you present yourself? And as a Business Marketing and Management major at Anoka Ramsey Community College, the scholarship is very welcome!" Many of the scholarship pageants in Minnesota are also open to young men as well, according to Kvamme. "They just need to come forward and ask. They are called Ambassadors or perhaps Commodores."

This isn't the first time Kvamme has been royalty. She was crowned Princess of St. Francis, Minnesota at 16 years-old, receiving a scholarship for that as well. Reservists must provide civilian employment info

Please be aware all 934th Airlift Wing reservists are required to annually recertify/validate their Civilian Employment Information (CEI). Most individuals currently showing as "in compliance" have a certification date more than 12 months old. In the very near future, members will begin showing as "not in compliance" due to expired certification. Active Guard/ Reserve (AGR) members will not have full-time civilian employment since their full-time employment is military; however, they may have a part-time job or specific voluntary service. They are encouraged but not required to provide that information. Military Technicians are required to provide their civilian employment information relative to their technician (civilian) employment.

Airmen will provide the following information: Employment Status (Choose one):

- **Full-time** If the Airman's employer considers the person a full-time employee, then the member is a full-time employee for purposes of CEI reporting.
- Part-time If the Airman's employer considers the person a part-time employee, then the member is a part-time employee for purposes of CEI reporting.
 - · Specified Voluntary Service Employment includes

only those activities performed as a member of a Service Auxiliary (such as the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary and the Civil Air Patrol) or is performed as volunteer service to a community service organization in the health, safety or national interest, provided that the service organization of which the voluntary service is performed anticipates or relies on the volunteer's availability and presence in order for the service organization to perform its services or mission.

- **Student** A person is considered a student if he or she is pursuing a higher education degree or trade certification.
- Not Currently Employed A person is considered currently not employed for the purposes of CEI reporting if he or she has no information to provide in the employment statuses of Full-Time, Part-Time, Specified Voluntary Service, or Student. (Reservists on manday tours with no civilian employment shall choose this option since this status addresses "civilian" employment and not "military" employment.)

Airmen will use a self-service application to provide civilian employment information. Name, Social Security Number and Birth date are required to log in to the application at https://www.dmdc.osd.mil/Guard-ReservePortal.

The structure, located at the south end of 34th Avenue, will allow for smoother operation of incoming traffic to the base, explained 1st Lieutenant Leo Moreno, Operations officer for the 934th Security Forces Squadron.

The new gate is also designed to adapt to future technologies that will improve base security, said Sergeant Wiatros.

The new gate will also have increased

traffic this fall as the inter-base gate will be closed for military exercises on the Air National Guard installation.


